## Participation Spotlight AVON volunteer Donna Johnson joins trial

Donna Johnson had participated in Avon Walk for Breast Cancer in Denver for several years, and for the July 2005 walk she signed on as Team Leader for the Wellness Village, meaning she was in charge of the all-volunteer crew for the overnight "camp" for participants. When she solicited a coworker for fundraising, her colleague wanted to learn about who received the money the Avon Foundation was raising. Donna looked on the Avon Foundation website to find specific examples of projects supported by the Avon Foundation. While doing so, she read about the ACRIN study Screening Breast Ultrasound in High-Risk Women and realized she might be eligible to participate. That night, she did further research about the study.

Donna, whose mother passed away from breast cancer, had known she was at high risk for breast cancer ever since she was a teenager. She discovered that the Sally Jobe Breast Center, where she had gone in the past for her mammograms, was one of 21 centers participating in the trial. Donna says, "I would never have found out about the study if I hadn't been fundraising. You give, and you don't know when you're going to get back. I got back really quickly."

When Donna went to the Sally Jobe Center for her imaging, the radiologist was impressed when he learned that she had been working with Avon, and he told her how important the Avon Foundation's support had been to the trial.



Donna describes her study experience as "absolutely incredible." The ultrasound detected a lump that the mammogram had missed, but fortunately the biopsy came back negative for cancer. Donna says of the Sally Jobe staff, "I cannot believe how caring they were throughout the entire process."

This past July, Donna was one of the evening speakers at the Avon Breast Cancer Walk, and she talked about her experiences on the study. Afterwards, people came up to her and expressed interest in participating. She says, "I've shared my story with quite a few people. If I'm talking to someone and I know they're high-risk, I tell them about this study right here in town." Donna is looking forward to completing the follow-up, and she's glad she found out about this study. She says with a laugh, "It was meant to be."
